



PRESIDENT'S DRIVE TO HUNTER LIGGETT

Choosing the destination for my Presidents' drive this year was pretty easy as I had always wanted to visit Hunter Liggett and stay at the historic Hearst Hacienda. Designed by famed Hearst Castle architect Julia Morgan and built in 1929, the Hacienda initially served a place to house the cowboys who worked on Hearst's huge ranch, the Hacienda. It's said that Hearst only visited the Hacienda once, staying in a lavish 2nd floor apartment in a tower topped with a golden dome (his paramour Marian Davies evidently stayed in a room directly below Hearst) I'm guessing there was a "secret stairway" connecting the two.

When I was creating the route that would get us down to Hunter Liggett, I wanted us to start in Santa Cruz (easy choice, as I live in the mountains nearby) and spend as little time driving on the main highways (Hwy 1 & Hwy 101) as possible. So, on a gray morning in September a group of Jaguar's gathered in Santa Cruz in front of the County Courthouse for a 2-day President's drive. This being the smallest group any of us had participated in, we all felt. What happened? Why didn't people sign up? Only 6 cars and 12 people out of a club with 240 members! We all felt we're just going to have a great time! Sandor and Karen had put a lot of effort into planning the drive we were about to experience with only a short time on highway 1 as we left Santa Cruz. So, as we prepared to leave Sandor asked me to hold up the rear,

which is my least favorite spot, but of course I said "fine". It was quickly evident that with only 6 cars we never lost sight of all the cars and our Presential leader. After a very short stint on Hwy 1 that got us out of town, we took a road that wound us through the foothills of the southern Santa Cruz mountains near the tiny hamlet of Corralitos. After crossing under Hwy 1, the route took us by dozens of agricultural fields which, at this harvest time of year, were often dotted with workers picking strawberries. These small ocean-adjacent roads were lovely, despite the overcast on the morning of the drive which rather muted our views of the blue Pacific Ocean. As we traversed the strawberry fields the sweet smell wafted through our cars. The next leg of the journey took us around the eastern fringe of the Elkhorn Slough reserve, where we saw innumerable egrets and the occasional heron hunting for their lunch. Just past the town of Moss landing, we turned onto another series of farm roads which eventually turned to River Road, a old rural road that ran just west of and parallel to the Hwy 101 freeway. We soon arrived at our lunch stop, an unpretentious little eatery and bar appropriately named Mo's River Road Grill where we ate delicious sandwiches, tacos and burgers.

The continuing journey took us further down the Salinas valley, where we were graced with scenic views of the eastern side of the coastal mountains as

well as the lush Salinas River which the road paralleled. At Soledad, we crossed over to the east side of Hwy 101 onto Metz Road which is the gateway to the Pinnacles National Park. Metz Road is a great little sports car road that features lots of twists and turns and small roller-coaster hills. Elevated a bit from the valley floor, this road offered lovely views of the valley and coastal hills. Another pass under 101 at King City put us onto Jolon Road which took us due west, out of the Salinas valley into a series of rolling hills alternately dotted with oaks and/or pine trees. Upon reaching Hunter Liggett we stopped at the historic Mission San Antonio de Padua which has to rank among California's most attractive missions. During our stay at the Fort Hunter Liggett Army Base we dined on pizza at a small bowling alley whose lanes were shut down; unfortunate, as a couple of Jag drivers had planned for us to have an informal bowling contest.

The next day, which was sunny yet temperate, the drive took a long stint on Interlake Road, which, predictably, ran in between two man-made lakes: Lake San Antonio and Lake Nacimiento. The terrain on this leg of the journey was ever changing, from grassy plains to scrubby, rocky hills to lush little valleys along small streams to a dried riverbed. Eventually, the route carried back to the Salinas Valley. But just before we reached King City and a fabulous lunch at the Cork & Plough, we were treated to one last little special moment: We crossed the Salinas River on an old truss-style one-lane bridge (built in 1874) which afforded a lovely view of the lush banks of the river which was still flowing in abundance.

This small group of Jag lovers had 2 days of beautiful scenery, roads you'd love to travel again, lots of fun exploring, couple of really good meals and one we just made do. Our President put together a fabulous event. Sorry you all missed it!



Exercise your CAT and have brunch at the Moss Beach Distillery on Sunday November 16, 2025. Join us for one of our most popular events. A short drive from multiple locations, followed by a display of our cats in the parking lot and then a delicious brunch in the Fitzgerald Room, with spectacular ocean views. We will meet at four Bay Area locations to caravan to the Moss Beach Distillery located at 140 Beach Way, Moss Beach. During Prohibition it was an ideal spot for rum running and bootleggers and became a 'speakeasy" establishment. The restaurant is located on a cliff above a secluded beach with fabulous views. It is also famous both because mystery writer Dashiell Hammett was a frequent visitor and used it as a setting for his detective stories and because long time JAG member Bernie Stein worked there in his teens! We will assemble in the parking lot south of the entrance by 11:00 to exhibit our CATS and socialize with brunch starting at 11:30. The brunch includes:

- > Fresh baked pastries (unlimited supply)
- > Fruit cup
- > A bottomless glass of orange juice, sparkling wine or Mimosas
- > Coffee or tea and soft drinks
- > #1: <u>Coastal Crab Cake Benedict</u>- two crab cakes topped with poached eggs and hollandaise. Served with homestyle potatoes
- > #2 <u>Grilled Pork Chops and Eggs</u>-One pork chop marinated in chimichurri with a mustard sauce, accompanied by eggs scrambled with parmesan cheese and artichoke hearts. Served with homestyle potatoes.
- > #3 <u>California Coastal Omelet</u>- Three egg omelet with chopped prawns, tomato, avocado, scallions, Monterey jack cheese, topped with a bay spice aioli, Served with homestyle potatoes.
- > #4 <u>Grilled Salmon Fillet</u>- Fresh Salmon filet served over homestyle potatoes with seasonal vegetables and beurre Blanc sauce.


